


The Population of Napa County







By Race



“Social Vulnerability” refers to the resilience of communities when faced with external stresses like natural disasters and disease outbreaks.


Some of us face many more barriers to support and safety, especially during emergencies.

by Census Tract





Municipal Equality Index

This measure from The Human Rights Campaign looks at how inclusive laws, policies and services are for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer or Questioning (LGBTQ) citizens. A checklist of where Napa County stands is divided in the 5 domains below.

Property Crimes — examples include pocket-picking, shoplifting and vehicle/bicycle theft.


Violent & Property Crime Rates in Napa County


Average Violent Crime Rate among Napa County's Cities

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are stressful or traumatic events that are strongly related to a wide range of health problems throughout a person's lifespan, including substance abuse.


-Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)

These include:

- verbal, emotional, physical and/or sexual abuse
- neglect
- incarceration of an adult
- alcohol or drug abuse by an adult
- violence between adults
- mental illness of someone at home
- parental divorce or separation

Comparison of State and Local Population Number of ACEs



Youth spend a large portion of their time at school. Harmful experiences, such as bullying and social exclusion, can have a wide spectrum of effects including anger, stress and depression.


Bullying Experienced at School among Napa County Ninth Graders by Race/Ethnicity

Places of Arts & Culture


The map below displays the number of arts and culture establishments, where people can congregate and engage in fun activities.



Meaningful Participation in School


Activities beyond schoolwork can enhance student engagement and connectedness.

Employment Rate


The map below displays the percent of the total civilian labor force who had paid work in 2016, which helps describe the state of the local economy.

The labor force consists of civilians at least 16 years old who either had a paid job or were seeking work during the survey period. People, such as students and retirees, are excluded from this total.




2016 Election Voter Turnout


Voting in Napa County for the 2016 Presidential Election




Adults Engaged in Formal Volunteering Work to Address Community Problems in the Past Year
